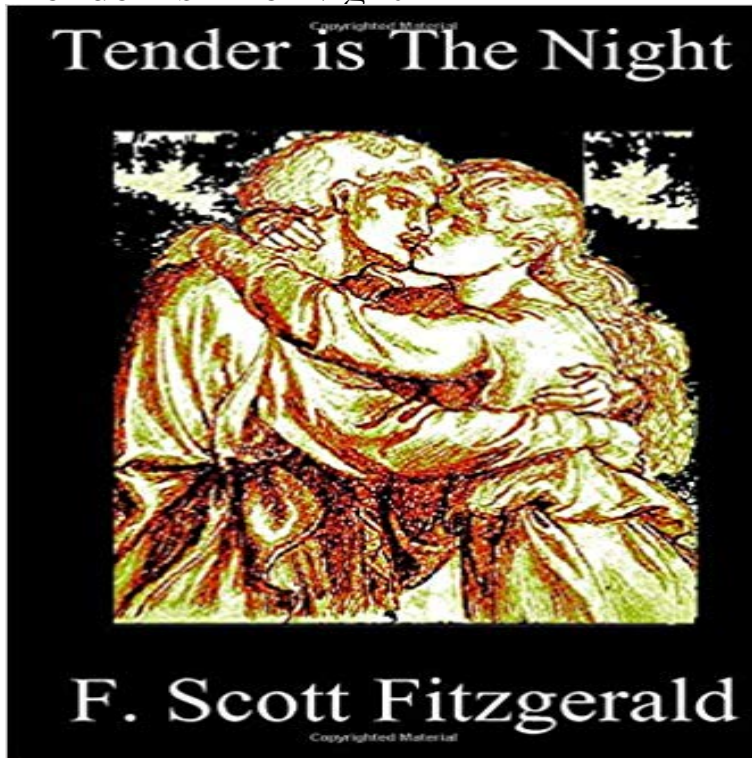


Tender Is The Night



Tender Is the Night is an autobiographical fiction by American writer F. Scott Fitzgerald. It was his fourth and final completed novel, which was first published in Scribners Magazine between January and April 1934 in four issues. Its title is from the poem Ode to a Nightingale by John Keats. The 1962 film Tender Is the Night, based on the novel, starred Jason Robards and Jennifer Jones as the Divers. The song Tender Is the Night, from the movie soundtrack, was nominated for the 1962 Academy Award for Best Song. Tender Is The Night was completed in the fall of 1933 and serialized in four installments in Scribners Magazine before its publication in a book on April 12, 1934. The book received mixed reviews and sales, much to the consternation of the author. It has since grown in sales as well as reputation. In 1998, the Modern Library ranked Tender Is the Night 28th on its list of the 100 best English-language novels of the 20th century. Two versions of this novel are in print. The first version, published in 1934, uses flashbacks; the second, revised version, prepared by Fitzgeralds friend and noted critic Malcolm Cowley on the basis of notes for a revision left by Fitzgerald, is ordered chronologically and was first published posthumously in 1948. Critics have suggested that Cowleys revision was undertaken due to negative reviews of the temporal structure of the first version of the book. Fitzgerald was born in 1896 in Saint Paul, Minnesota, in an upper-middle-class family. He was named after his famous second cousin, Francis Scott Key but was referred to by the familiar moniker Scott Fitzgerald. He was also named after his deceased sister, Louise Scott, one of two sisters who died shortly before his birth. Fitzgerald attended St. Paul Academy in St. Paul from 1908 to 1911. When he was 13, he saw his first detective story published in the school newspaper. In 1911, when

Fitzgerald was 15 years old, his parents sent him to the Newman School in Hackensack, New Jersey where he graduated in 1913. Later he studied at Princeton and met the future critics and writers Edmund Wilson in 1916 and John Peale Bishop in 1917. Due to his writing pursuits, he was placed on academic probation, and in 1917, he dropped out of school to join the U.S. Army. Afraid that he might die in World War I with his literary dreams unfulfilled, Fitzgerald hastily wrote a novel called *The Romantic Egotist* before reporting for duty. Fitzgerald was commissioned a second lieutenant in the infantry and sent to Camp Sheridan outside of Montgomery, Alabama. At a country club, Fitzgerald met and fell in love with Zelda Sayre (1900-1948), the daughter of an Alabama Supreme Court justice. The war ended in 1918 and Fitzgerald was released from army. He moved to New York City to launch a career in advertising, which was lucrative enough to convince Zelda to marry him. He worked for the Barron Collier advertising agency and lived in a single room at 200 Claremont Avenue in the Morningside Heights neighborhood on Manhattan's west side. When his novel *Other Side of the Paradise* was published in 1920, Fitzgerald earned money and fame as a writer. Zelda agreed to marry him and they were married in New York's St. Patrick's Cathedral. Their daughter and only child, Frances Scott Fitzgerald, was born on October 26, 1921. Fitzgerald died on December 21, 1940 at age 44, before he could complete *The Love of the Last Tycoon* which was published in 1941 as *The Last Tycoon*, and in 1994 as *The Love of the Last Tycoon*.
